



### How did the Romans change Britain?

<p>Create a simple timeline showing key events from the Roman invasion of Britain. Include at least <b>5 important dates or events</b> and add pictures or symbols to illustrate them.</p>	<p>Write a short paragraph explaining <b>why the Romans wanted to invade Britain</b>. Try to include at least <b>three reasons</b>.</p>	<p>Pretend you are interviewing a Roman soldier. Prepare <b>5 questions</b> and practise answering them out loud as the soldier. You may perform this to someone at home.</p>
<p>Design and decorate a Roman shield. Use patterns, symbols or colours that represent strength and power. Write a short explanation of why you chose your design.</p>	<p>Create a fact file about <b>Boudicca</b>. Include headings such as <i>Who was she?</i>, <i>Why is she important?</i> and <i>What did she do?</i> Add pictures if you like.</p>	<p>Draw or write about <b>one way the Romans changed Britain</b> (e.g. roads, houses, baths). Explain how it helped people then and how it still affects us today.</p>
<p>Choose one Roman invention (such as roads, aqueducts or toilets). Write a few sentences explaining <b>what it was used for</b> and <b>why it was important</b>.</p>	<p>Using objects from home (e.g. cardboard, stones, Lego), build a small model of a Roman road. Label the parts or explain how the Romans made their roads strong.</p>	<p>Write a diary entry imagining you are a child living in Roman Britain. Describe your day, what you eat, where you live and what life is like.</p>
<p>Create a poster explaining <b>three reasons why the Roman army was so successful</b>. Include pictures, labels and key words.</p>	<p>Create a glossary of <b>at least 8 Roman-related words</b> (e.g. legion, empire, invasion). Write a child-friendly definition for each.</p>	<p>Prepare a short talk, mini-book, slideshow or drawing that teaches someone at home <b>three facts about the Romans</b>. Practise explaining your ideas clearly.</p>
